

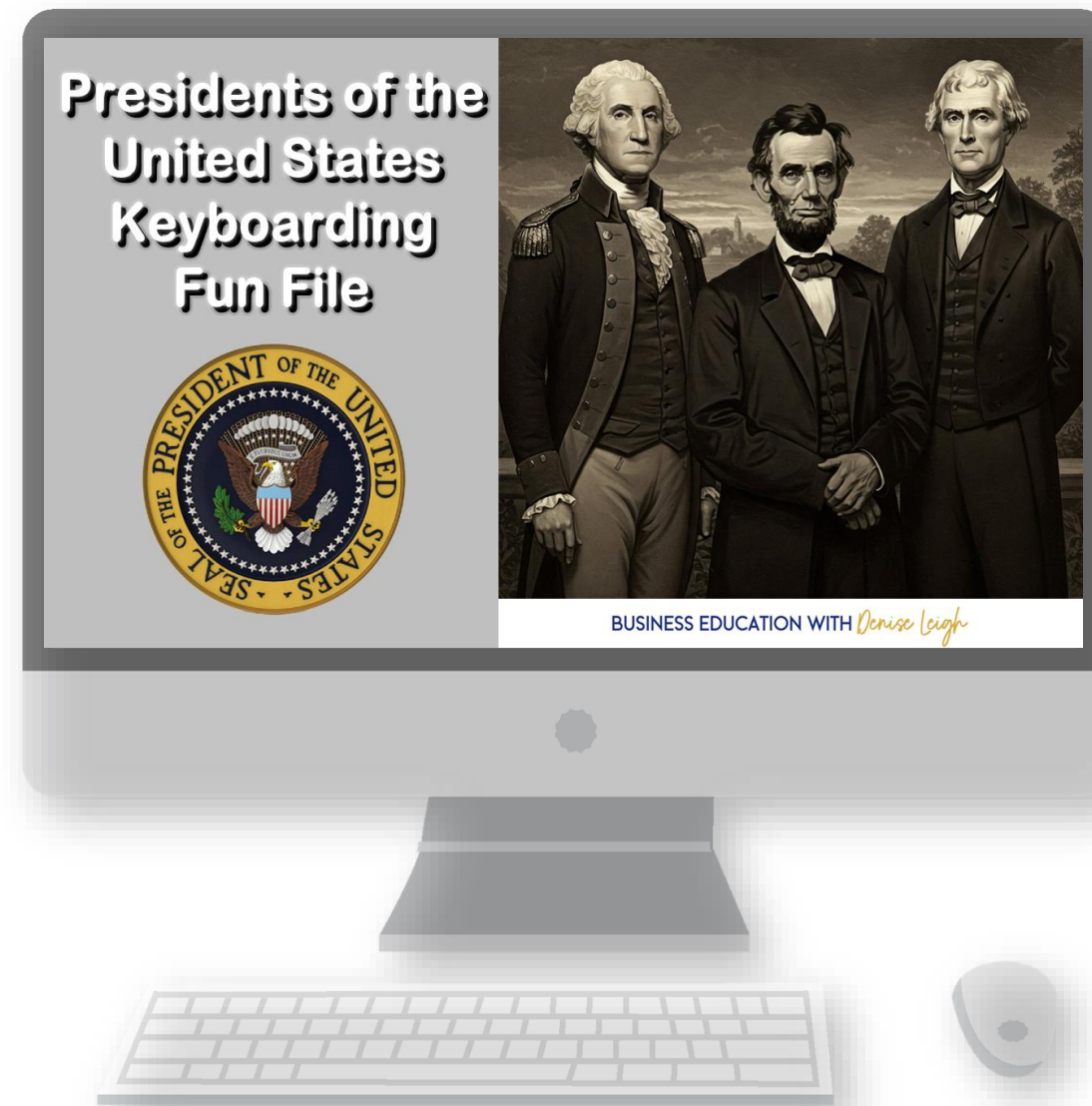

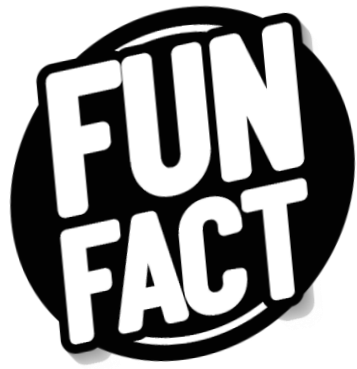

First President to use the internet.

In 1994, Bill Clinton became the first president to send an email over the Internet while in office. The email was sent from Clinton's AOL email account, ClintonP2@aol.com, to Swedish prime minister Carl Bildt.



Who was the First President to Have a Phone?

In May 1877, Rutherford B. Hayes was the first president to install a telephone in the White House's telegraph room. For his first call, he called the inventor of the phone, Alexander Graham Bell, who was located 13 miles away.

Facts about the White House

- The White House is the residence of the current President.
- There are 132 rooms, 32 bathrooms, and 6 levels to accommodate all the people who live in, work in, and visit the White House. There are also 412 doors, 147 windows, 28 fireplaces, 7 staircases, and 3 elevators.
- At various times in history, the White House has been known as the "President's Palace," the "President's House," and the "Executive Mansion." President Theodore Roosevelt officially gave the White House its current name in 1901.
- The White House receives approximately 6,000 visitors a day.
- With five full-time chefs, the White House kitchen is able to serve dinner to as many as 140 guests and hors d'oeuvres to more than 1,000.
- The White House requires 570 gallons of paint to cover its outside surface.
- For recreation, the White House has a variety of facilities available to its residents, including a tennis court, a jogging track, swimming pool, movie theater, billiard room, and a bowling lane.
